Rules and Regulations

All cheques issued in payment of prizes must be cashed by December 31st of same year or the exhibitor will forfeit the right to prize money.

- 1 All exhibitors must be members of the society by paying their annual membership fee of \$5.00
- 2 The price of next year's member's ticket will be deducted from all exhibitors taking prizes to the amount of \$5.00 or over.
- 3 In Classes 1-40, 15% of prize money will be deducted in lieu of entry fees.
- 4 Any prize less than \$3.00 in total for non-school children, will be considered a donation to the Society if not picked up on the Sunday of the fair.
- 5 All stock and produce entered must be the property of the person in whose name it is entered.
- 6 All entries must be in place in the building by 12 NOON the FRIDAY of the FAIR and remain in place until 3:30 pm on Sunday.
- 7 Livestock to enter at north gates.
- 8 Judges of all kinds of articles except livestock will commence their duties at 1:00 p.m. on Friday. Judges of livestock will commence their duties at 12:00 p.m. on Saturday, and judges of horses will commence their duties at 10:00 a.m. Saturday.
- 9 Judges shall have discretionary powers to withhold any prize where they deem an article unworthy. Judges may disqualify soiled, defaced or old work.
- 10 The decision of judges shall be final as to awarding of prizes and no appeal will be considered except in case of protest. All protests shall be made in writing and shall be delivered within one hour of the award to the Secretary's office. Any exhibitor or interested person making such a protest will be required to deposit the sum of \$5.00 and if said protest is not sustained, the sum shall be retained by the Society. The directors reserve the right in all cases to interpret their own rules.
- 11 Only one prize will be allowed to an exhibitor in one section of the class. This rule does not apply to livestock.
- 12 Exhibitors showing purebred cattle must produce pedigree if required by judges.
- 13 No animal shown as fat shall be allowed to exhibit as one of a herd.
- 14 No horse can be shown in more than one regular line class. Specials excepted.
- 15 This Society will not be responsible for any loss, or damage, or accident occurring to any person or property on the fairgrounds during the Fair. While the officers and directors of the Society will use every available means to prevent accidents in and about the grounds, it must be strictly understood that all persons going into or upon the show grounds must personally assume all risk of accidents, or injury from accidents, or from any cause whatsoever.

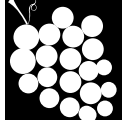

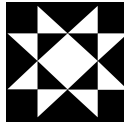

NOTE: The following is information on the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies Annual Championship Quilt Competition.

Eligibility, Rules and Regulations

GENERAL CONDITIONS

- A. Entries must be solely made and hand-quilted by the exhibitor and exhibited and judged at a local Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies' (O.A.A.S.) Fair to be eligible for this competition.
- B. Entry quilts must be a minimum of 324" on the perimeter.
- C. Judging will occur at local fairs and district levels. A Provincial Grand Champion Quilt will be selected at the Annual Convention of O.A.A.S.
- D. Upon making an entry into the Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies Quilt Competition, the Exhibitor agrees to participate in any promotional activities related to the competition.
- E. The winning Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies Champion Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future District and/or Convention O.A.A.S. competitions.
- F. Winner's name and pattern to be displayed at the Fair on sign provided by O.A.A.S.
- G. The winning quilt at OAAS Convention in February will be awarded \$500 and exhibitor will retain ownership of the quilt.
- H. Champion handmade and machine-quilted quilt/wallhanging will be entered into District Competition by the Society.

O.A.A.S. COMPETITION -

Machine-Quilted Quilt/Wall Hanging

Same rules as above except A: must be solely made and machine-quilted by the exhibitor. The quilt must be machine-quilted by the exhibitor, not a professional. Quilt must have visible machine quilting. Entries to be measured on the perimeter: Total perimeter measurement to be a minimum of 324 inches.

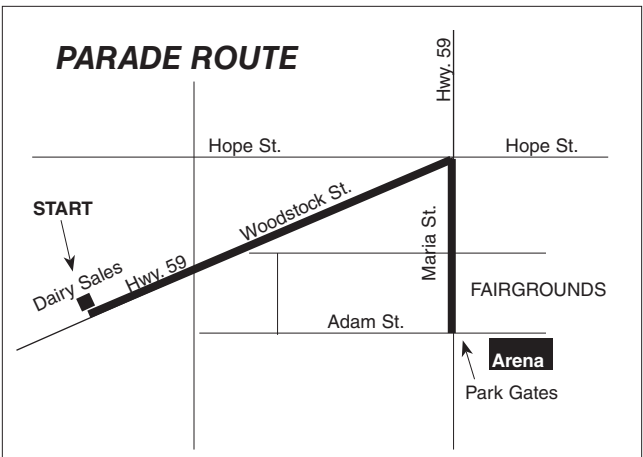
